Go to the previous page to see how to form questions. If you don't see the exercises, you will see some more questions in the next page or module.

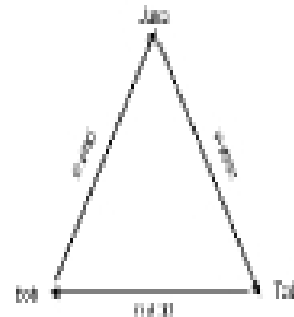
### Procedure

- Write the questions on paper.
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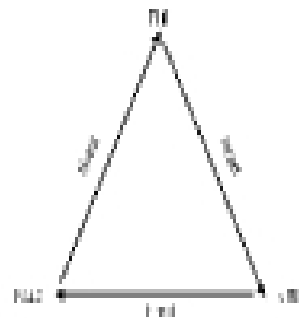
