1. coordinating conjunction (and, but, or, for, nor)

These conjunctions are preceded by a comma.

2. a semicolon (;)

Correct

I was eager to attend the dance, but did not know what to wear.

I understood his problem; I had experienced it last week.

Incorrect

I was eager to attend the dance but, did not know what to wear.

The KMEL van parked in front of the school and everyone looked to see who was inside.

I understood his problem; and I had experienced it last week.
