## PREPOSITIONS Prepositional Phrases

**A prepositional phrase begins with a preposition.** A phrase is a group of words. Therefore, a prepositional phrase is a **group of words that begins with a preposition.**

Examples: **on** the boat  
**after** the storm  
**from** my dad  
**with** his aunt  
**behind** the shed

Note that the last word is something you can see (concrete noun). Some will end in a noun such as *love* that you can't see (abstract noun). A prepositional phrase may also end with *me, him, her, us, them, you, it, or whom*.

*For the first four items, the preposition is underlined. For the remaining items, the preposition is not underlined.*
