Exercises on compound and complex sentences.

A **compound sentence** consists of two or more simple sentences (or independent clauses) joined by the conjunction and, but, or or (also for, nor, or yet). Observe that there is a complete thought—a complete sentence—with a subject and a verb both before and after the conjunction in a compound sentence.

- Lydia tried to push to the front of the line, but the other customers would not let her through. (Notice the position of the COMMA.)
- ➤ Harry really enjoys ravioli, and his father works in a department store. WHY IS THIS SENTENCE NOT POSSIBLE?

A **complex sentence** consists of one independent clause and one or more subordinate clauses. There are 1) adverb subordinate clauses, 2) adjective subordinate clauses (also called relative clauses), and 3) noun subordinate clauses.

<u>Adverb clause</u>: When metal is heated, it expands. (when=subordinating conjunction) <u>Adjective clause</u>: The book that she was reading did not hold her interest. (that=relative pronoun: answers question "which book?") <u>Noun clause</u>: He told me that the bus was late. (that=subordinating conjunction. We have the pattern S—V—dO.

Exercise 1: Put a comma before the conjunction in each compound sentence and prove that it is compound by <u>underling the subject and the verb</u> in each independent clause. Add no comma to any sentence containing a compound predicate (two verbs joined by a coordinating conjunction).

- 3. The mechanic checked the motor but could find nothing wrong.
