

4 Quotation Marks



Punctuation Rule

Put quotation marks around the titles of songs, poems, articles in newspapers and magazines, chapters in books, TV show episodes, essays, short stories, short plays, speeches, and works of art.

Here are some examples:

Martin Luther King, Jr.'s "I Have a Dream" speech is one of the greatest ever made.

My favorite song from *The Lion King* is "Hakuna Matata."

Note: The titles of books, newspapers, magazines, movies, and TV shows should be underlined (when written by hand) or italicized (when typed on a computer).
