Writing Project #1: Analyzing Visual Rhetoric

Assignment

Your assignment is to write a coherent, grammatically correct paper (700-800 words) that analyzes content and design in a **visual argument** (a photograph, printed or online advertisement, editorial cartoon). The paper should include a copy of whatever you are analyzing and provide a bibliographical citation. The analysis should be your own. Library research is not required; however, you may want to consult sources in order to understand the complexities of the rhetorical situation or to get a sense of the different perspective readers embrace on the topic you selected. If you use other sources, they must be cited according to MLA guidelines.

Your paper should place the visual argument in a context for your intended readers, identify claims and inferences, explain why the appeals in the argument are or are not persuasive, and comment on any cultural values the argument addresses, criticizes, or advocates. Your aim is to convince your intended readers to take seriously your "reading" of the visual argument. Follow MLA guidelines for format and documentation.
